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SPOKEN LANGUAGE/COMPOSITION 10 COURSE OUTLINE

Spoken Language 10 is designed to support students in their development of spoken communication through processes of questioning, exploring, and sampling. This course builds students' spoken language competencies by introducing them to varied structures, forms, and styles of oral compositions and by providing opportunities for students to individually and collaboratively study, draft, and use language to create original pieces in a variety of modes. This course will provide students with opportunities for performance, storytelling, and public speaking. Areas of focus include study of the spoken word/slam poetry, poetry performance, oral storytelling, play reading, radio play/podcasts, professional applications, speech writing/presenting, proposals and interviewing.

Composition 10 focuses on the development of written communication through a critical process of questioning, exploring, and sampling. Within a supportive community of writers, students will work individually and collaboratively to explore and create coherent, purposeful pieces and projects. Students will read and study compositions by other writers and consider a variety of styles as models for the development of their writing. This course builds students' writing competencies by introducing them to varied structures, forms, and styles of compositions. Students have opportunities to individually and collaboratively study, create, and write original pieces, exploring audience and purpose. They also develop their craft through processes of drafting, reflecting, and revising. We will explore:

- •narrative, expository, descriptive, persuasive, and opinion pieces
- •planning, drafting, and editing processes
- •writing for specific audiences and specific disciplines
- •how to cite sources, consider the credibility of evidence, and evaluate the quality and reliability of the source

CORE COMPETENCIES:

There are three core competencies: *Communication* (Communicating & Collaborating), *Thinking* (Critical Thinking, Creative and Reflective Thinking), *Personal/Social* (Personal Awareness and Responsibility, Social Awareness and Responsibility and Positive Personal and Cultural Identity). - Illegally obtaining or looking at an examination prior to, or during the exam,
- Altering or changing test answers after submitting the test;
- Texting answers or electronically copying parts of a test or assignment;
- Knowingly helping another student to cheat.
