Artificial Turf Field Advocacy: The HPAC ATF committee was successful in advocating for the ATF. We started more than one and a half years ago with conversations with the SD, presentations to the SD, presentation to the DNV, meetings with Jordan Back, advocacy during the Muncipal Elections in October, more meetings with the Mayor and Jonathon Wilkinson in December, advocacy at the Council meetings January through March. Our work paid off! Handsworth ATF is now budgeted! I want to thank Jess Bratty, Erin Stevenson, and Shane Lowry and the committee for all the hard work you did in advocating for this!

Current Overview

- 1. General Overview
- HPAC only ran one major fundraising campaign: Teacher's Luncheon donations cover 80% of costs, with HPAC reserves covering any balance
- Legacy / Gift to New School was deferred for 2023/24 parents
- Hot Lunch continuance has enabled HPAC to support Athletics programs, freeing up gaming funds for all other requests
- With limited hot lunch funding in 2023/24 equal distribution of gaming funding will become more important and will limit HPAC's ability to fully fund requests:
- i. Clubs & Extracurricular
- ii. School based special requests
- iii. Performing Arts: Music, Dance, Drama
- iv. Athletics: Equipment, Teams
- Two recurring/usual funding areas were managed through other sources and did not require HPAC general funding: G8 Retreat/Welcome was sufficiently funded via Gaming; Grad 23 was sufficiently funding through parent events/donations
- Parent Grad finances/bank accounts were successfully transferred to HPAC for oversight and a signing officer; account will be left with funds available for new Class of '24 committee to support early event deposits

- HPAC continues to invest in BCCPAC, supplies to support the Hot Lunch program (like updated Square reader), and Munch-A-Lunch which also supports other Club fundraising/sales throughout the year
- HPAC is seeking a new Treasurer
