Walk for Wenjack

The <u>Downie Wenjack Foundation</u> promotes the instruction and education of the Indian Residential School System and it's greater, long lasting impact across Canada. As a Downie Wenjack Legacy School, Lynnmour/<u>X</u>á7elcha is committed to doing our part for Truth and Reconciliation.

The story of Chanie Wenjack (<u>as told in Macleans magazine</u> in an article title "The lonely death of Chanie Wenjack" in 1967) shares the tragic tale of a young boy who was taken to residential school. Due to his desire to return home and the conditions he faced at the school, he escaped and began a lengthy journey. Unfortunately, he came to a tragic end, but his story has become one that has opened the eyes of more Canadians about the truth of our past.

Division 1 students, shared Chanie's story through a visual representation of his journey. It was a short, powerful display that spoke to many students and staff.
