


Welcome

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"Be Kind to You, Be Kind to All" - Pink Shirt Day 2023



PINK SHIRT DAY - Feb. 22, 2023

Now a movement celebrated across the globe, **Pink Shirt Day** has humble beginnings. Inspired by an act of kindness in small-town Nova Scotia, CKNW Kids' Fund, working with partners Boys & Girls Clubs and 980 CKNW, was inspired to raise funds to support anti-bullying programs. Here is a snippet of an article detailing the original incident:

"David Shepherd, Travis Price and their teenage friends organized a high-school protest to wear pink in sympathy with a Grade 9 boy who was being bullied [for wearing a pink shirt]...[They] took a stand against bullying when they protested against the harassment of a new Grade 9 student by distributing pink T-shirts to all the boys in their school. 'I learned that two people can come up with an idea, run with it, and it can do wonders,' says Mr. Price, 17, who organized the pink protest. 'Finally, someone stood up for a weaker kid.' So Mr. Shepherd and some others headed off to a discount store and bought 50 pink tank tops. They sent out messages to schoolmates that night, and the next morning they hauled the shirts to school in a plastic bag. As they stood in the foyer handing out the shirts, the bullied boy walked in. His face spoke volumes. 'It looked like a huge weight was lifted off his shoulders,' Mr. Price recalled. The bullies were never heard from again."



Collaborative communications

Proactive and productive parent-school relationships positively impact student success and well-being. The purpose of communication between parents/guardians and schoc employees is to create, maintain and enhance positive relationships in support of the student's educational plan.

Levels of communication

Parents often need to communicate with various staff members – teachers, support staff, administrators, and/or school district-level staff. As a general quideline for determining who to communicate with, communication should remain as close to the 'source' as possible. For example, if the topic pertains to something within the classroom, speak to the classroom teacher. Even at times when conversations may be uncomfortable, it is most productive to speak with the staff member directly involved and responsible. By starting with the source, communication is more efficient and effective.

Guiding questions

Here are some example quiding questions that can be used to prepare for and during meetings. These questions are designed to ensure communication meets the objective of sunnorting student success and well-being:

- What is the topic/issue that needs to be addressed?
- purpose or goal? What is the overall plan for the student's education?
- · How would we like the student to be involved in the
- process of creating their educational and future goals? Does the student need to join the conversation?
- What is the role of an Individualized Education Plan
- What is our communication plan (timeline and
- What are the choices or options of support we ought
- · What actions do we need to take next?

Guide for collaborative communication

- 1. Speak to the appropriate person. Teacher or Principal - person closest to the source.

- or Principal person closest to the source.

 2. Be simple, clear, concise. As a general rule of thumb, keep digital communication short and to the point. If more in-depth communication is required, set-up a meeting.

 3. Be prepared. Determine the purpose and objectives of the meeting, and the questions the meeting needs to address.

 4. Establish next steps. Solilaboratively determine what actions are required from all those involved. Determine what the communication timeline and process will be moving forward.

 5. Follow through and follow-up. Complete
- Follow through and follow-up. Complete action steps and communicate progress back to all those involved according to the communications timeline and process that was established.

MMIWG2S March

Reflections from Ms. Yeo's Social Justice 12 class that joined hundreds of people gathering in downtown Vancouver this week to honour the lives of missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls, trans and two-spirit people at the 32nd annual Women's Memorial March.



One thing that was hopeful:

It felt hopeful seeing everyone come together to protest and remember all of the MMIW. I loved seeing people walking around with the sage, and handing out Pins. I saw so many people wearing red in support, and a 10+ of Indigenous people wearing traditional clothing and shoring food. It gave me hope seeing everyone stand together to face and talk about this issue. Everybody was listening so respectfully and it was overall a peaceful protest.



One thing that everyone should know is:

The nationwide epidemic of high rates of disappearances and murders of Indigenous women, not only in British Columbia but in other provinces as well. The fact that it is still currently happening around the country serves as concrete evidence of predation, exploitation, oppression, and

violence against Indigenous women.

Everyone should also know that the march wasn't just a clear-cut one-off thing, it is just a single, but significant, step towards attaining justice for the MMIW; a step towards truth and reconciliation; and a call for action not just for the government but for the citizens as well. It is a wakeup call for people to address and resolve the ongoing racism, discrimination, and negative stereotyping against indigenous people.

I also think that everyone should know about this movement. Even though they are not directly affected by it, they must at least know about it and hopefully take a stand on it. Being privileged enough to not be affected by an issue does not mean you have the right to turn a blind eye to issues being faced by others.


