Superintendent's Report



Dear Parents and Guardians.

I would like to begin this issue of the Superintendent's Report by providing you with an update regarding COVID-19.

Mask Wearing

Today, Provincial Health Officer Dr. Bonnie Henry and Honourable Minister of Education Jennifer Whiteside announced an update to the K-12 education health and safety guidelines. Starting Monday, October 4, 2021, **all students in B.C. schools** will be required to wear a mask when inside a school building, including while at their desks. We welcome the government's efforts to expand health and safety measures for K-12 students. We also acknowledge:

- Students in grade 4-12, staff and other adults (i.e. visitors) are already wearing masks;
- There are allowable exemptions to mask wearing (refer to page 20 of the <u>Provincial COVID-19 Communicable Disease Guidelines for K-12 Settings</u>); and
- We may need to allow time for some of our littlest learners to adjust to the change in mask wearing requirements.

We are acutely aware the North Vancouver School District community of students, families and staff is one that cares deeply for one another—their safety, health and well-being—and will work together to ensure this and any potential future changes to health and safety measures in schools are implemented in a supportive and respectful manner.

School Exposures and Preventative Measures

With COVID-19 cases within the community, and schools a reflection of what is happening in the community, we should expect school exposure events to continue. As a gentle reminder, we are asking everyone to be cautious with their social interactions, especially for those who are not fully vaccinated. We also ask both staff and students (the latter with the assistance of parents/guardians) to please continue to complete a





<u>Daily Health Check</u>. If a staff member or a student is feeling ill or you think you may have been exposed to COVID-19, please stay home and follow the directions of a healthcare provider.

We continue to review our communicable disease prevention and exposure control measures in schools, and in light of the recent COVID-19 exposures significantly impacting one of our elementary school communities (Capilano), the North Vancouver School District has asked elementary school administration teams to initiate additional preventative measures including:

- Adjusting class seating plans to make use of all available space.
- Limiting movement between classes, both indoors and outdoors.
- Minimizing/avoiding group work.
- Maintaining staggered recess and lunch periods and/or creating separate play zones, where possible.
- Strictly enforcing the wearing of face masks for those who are required and can
 wear one (recognizing there are acceptable exceptions to this) and supporting all
 students (K-12) with wearing a face mask.
- Reinforcing regular handwashing and hand hygiene practices, particularly when entering and leaving a shared location.
- Encouraging students and staff to maximize personal spacing.

With respect to Capilano Elementary, I would like to acknowledge Principal Jeeniece Chand and Vice Principal Stephanie Maki for their tremendous leadership through a very challenging time as COVID-19 cases continue to be reported in that community. I also raise my hands in appreciation to the staff and families of Capilano Elementary for their continued support and kindness towards all those impacted by COVID-19.

School Exposure Notifications

Our process for communicating school exposure notifications will continue in accordance with the provincial Management of Illness and Exposures at Schools protocols. We are committed to communicating with you what we are permitted to share. Our health authority, Vancouver Coastal Health (VCH), has assured us it will contact anyone who must self-isolate or self-monitor as a result of a school exposure. Truth and Reconciliation Week: September 27 - October 1

Truth and Reconciliation Week concludes today. Foundation Skills Assessment

The Foundation Skills Assessment (FSA) is an annual province-wide assessment of students' academic skills, and provides a snapshot of students' foundational skills in literacy and numeracy. All students in grades 4 and 7 are required by the Ministry of Education to write the FSA. The FSA will be administered at schools between October 4 and October 29, 2021. Be Bear Aware

According to the North Shore Black Bear Society (NSBBS), fall is the most active time for bears. North Shore residents can expect to see bears on the trails and passing through neighbourhoods, particularly as they search for natural food. Here are a few things we can all do to keep ourselves and bears safe this season:

- Keep garbage and organics in a secure area (garage/shed) until the morning of collection.
- Freeze odorous organics such as meat and fish. Wrap organics in newspaper to help keep carts clean.
- Collect all fruit from trees, collect fallen fruit daily and keep in a secure area.
- Clean your BBQ grill and grease trap after each use.
- Feed pets inside and keep excess food in a secure area.
- Keep garage and lower level doors closed unless you are in the immediate area.
- Keep vehicles locked and free of food and garbage.
- Do not follow a bear you see in the neighbourhood or on a trail for a photograph.
