New Curriculum and Communicating Student Learning (report cards)

Over the last few years, the Ministry of Education has updated and unveiled a new curriculum for all subjects and all grades, kindergarten through to grade 12. The first wave of implementation, grades K to 9, was implemented in the fall of 2016. The grade 10 curriculum was implemented in 2017. The final implementation for grades 11 and 12 will occur in September 2019, along with the new graduation program for grades 10 to 12. Update: Staffing of Learning Support Teachers

In June 2018, the North Vancouver Board of Education approved an additional eight full-time equivalent (FTE) learning support teachers (LST) for the 2018/2019 school year. These LST were in

place in September 2018, providing support for students with special needs. In November 2018, the Ministry of Education approved funding for these eight FTE LST, along with seven more FTE LST for a total of 15 FTE LST. Argyle Construction Update

Construction continues on the new Argyle Secondary replacement school. The majority of buried work has been completed (footings, electrical conduit, plumbing, etc.). Construction activity has now commenced at concrete floor slabs. Excavation and foundation permits have been issued by the District of North Vancouver. The steel frame is anticipated to go up within the coming month. The application for a development permit for the western portion of the property (turf field) will soon be submitted. Target occupancy for the new school remains as September 2020.

Highlands Elementary



In Amy Wright's class, I spent some time participating in the art project the students were working on. It was a lively and engaged group who were enthusiastically participating in their project.

Inspiring and incredibly enriching is how I would describe it.

Laura Ellwood welcomed me into her youth program class. The students were working on legends and short stories. We spoke at length about how her class is personalized for the students to meet their needs. Again, inspiring and enriching to see the amazing teaching occurring at the school. I also

spent some time with the Capilano University adult math program that is offered at the centre, and was honoured to hang out with staff during their morning break.
