PROPOSED 2020/21 School Calendar: Public Comment – Jan 22nd – Feb 21st

The Board of Education invites your feedback on the PROPOSED calendar for the 2020/21 school year. The opportunity to provide your comment and feedback begins Wednesday, January 22, 2020 and ends Friday, February 21, 2020.

A summary of feedback received through the Thoughtexchange tool will be shared with the Board of Education at their Public Board Meeting scheduled for March 10, 2020. The Board will finalize and approve a 2020/21 School Calendar at the March meeting to meet the March 31st deadline for submission of the calendar to the Ministry of Education.

IB approved for Norgate

At the public meeting of the North Vancouver Board of Education on Tuesday, January 21, 2020, the Board unanimously voted in favour of transitioning Norgate Community Elementary School to an International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme school. In September 2020, Norgate Community Elementary School will begin to implement the IB PYP curriculum and program requirements. The 2020/21 school year will be a transition year, with formal accreditation occurring the following school year. The North Vancouver School District has been providing IB programs since 2007, and will now be able to offer the full continuum of IB programming for Norgate students from Kindergarten through to Grade 12.

Thank you to the Norgate community for your support over the past few months as the school district has explored the possibility of bringing IB to Norgate Community Elementary School. The community's response in favour of this change has been overwhelmingly positive.

Gordon Smith passing

On Saturday, January 18, 2020, at the age of 100, Gordon Smith passed away. Smith was a significant supporter of the North Vancouver School District through our Artists for Kids program. He donated many pieces of his art to us and volunteered a significant amount of time supporting young artists. The art gallery located at our central office on Lonsdale is a result of Smith; it is named the *Gordon Smith Gallery of Canadian Art*. Our vast collection of Canadian art invites students to

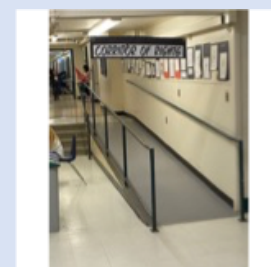
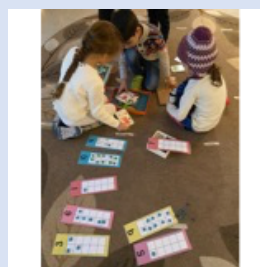
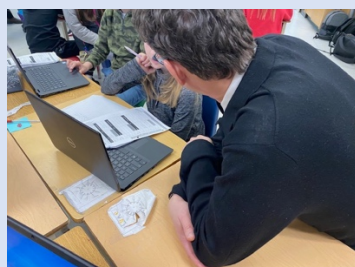
consider their identity and their culture as a Canadian. Smith's deep belief in art education has touched the lives of so many young Canadians. Smith's generosity through his art, and his commitment and support over three decades, has allowed our Artists for Kids program to grow from an idea into a world-class program, that offers all students an opportunity to grow and contribute.

Smith was born in 1919 in England and moved to Winnipeg with his family in 1933. He came to Vancouver in 1940. He did his art education at the Vancouver School of Art, then taught at the school for a decade. Smith joined the Faculty of Education at UBC and taught art until his retirement in 1982. The last 30 years of his artistic career have been his most prolific. As a master of colour, he explored the BC landscape in a fresh, expressive and aggressive style that is unparalleled by other artists. Smith was awarded the Order of Canada for his significant contribution to Canadian culture in 1996. His works are held internationally in the collection of the National Gallery of Canada, the Vancouver Art Gallery, the Museum of Modern Art in New York, and the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, England, among others. He is represented by the Equinox Gallery in Vancouver, BC.

Gordon Smith was truly a remarkable man, a brilliant artist and educator, who inspired us to shine. We are privileged to continue his legacy with Artists for Kids.

Capilano Elementary School



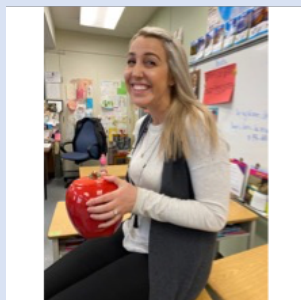

Then I visited Ashley Pulice's kindergarten class where the students were doing a variety of play-based learning activities. Then I popped into Fiona Stroh's grade 7 class where they were doing a music appreciation lesson connecting the meaning of music to other issues and cultures. In Kelsey Mulvihill's kindergarten class students were in circle expressing their feelings, and then they honoured a student's birthday with a song. In grade 5, Paul Kostamo, Tara Pringle and Laura Eastwood's students were learning about government structures by undertaking an election process – complete with myself as Prime Minister and Principal Beveridge and Vice Principal Chand as Premiers. I briefly visited with Heidi Wightman, an Education Assistant who was hard at work. I popped into Heidi Waterman's grade 1 class where students were doing a literacy activity. Belinda Harnden's grade 6 class was planning a vacation trip – including budgeting. Danica Marining's grade 3s were researching and creating guessing books about animals. Grade 4 students in Kaira Pena's class were doing math. Karen Todd's grade 4 students were exploring local animals and the connection to Indigenous teachings. Artists for Kids



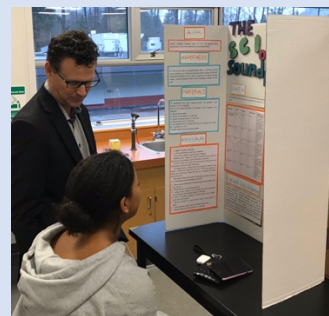
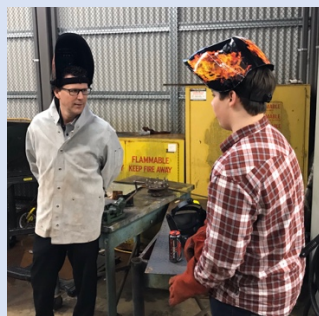

Vancouver Coastal Health updates

Coronavirus (named 2019-nCoV)

Vancouver Coastal Health would like to advise North Vancouver School District that the risk to the general public, including school-age children, is very low. Medical Health Officers continue to monitor the situation closely, and will provide further advice and information as it becomes available. At this time, reports indicate that, similar to influenza, this virus is spread when a sick person coughs or sneezes. Most of the reported cases are only showing mild symptoms and are well enough to stay home. As with influenza, elderly people and those with underlying health conditions are more likely to develop severe disease and require hospitalization. In the meantime, people are reminded to follow proper hygiene etiquette during the cold and flu season. This includes proper hand-washing with soap and water, covering your mouth and nose with a tissue when coughing or sneezing, and staying home when you are sick.
