INTRODUCTION

The new curriculum for Grades 8 through 12 is grouped under three core competencies: Communication, Thinking, and Personal and Social Competency, and mandated by the provincial government.

BIG IDEAS

- Language and text can be a source of creativity and joy.
- Exploring stories and other texts helps us understand ourselves and make connections to others and to the world.
- People understand text differently depending on their worldviews and perspectives.
- Texts are socially, culturally, and historically constructed.
- Questioning what we hear, read, and view contributes to our ability to be educated and engaged citizens.

COURSE CONTENT

- 1. The Short Story various selections
- 2. The Novel -The Outsiders
- 3. Poetry selections from *Poetry in Focus* and other sources
- 4. Language selections and exercises from Language Power: Book F and other sources

Grammar, language usage, and editing skills will be incorporated into the above units.

- novel (silent reading)

TIMETABLE

The 2020-2021 school year is divided into quarters of approximately 42 days. In Stage 2, English Language Arts 8 classes are approximately 2 hours 20 minutes each and fully face-to-face. A short 5-10 min break(s) will be built into each class.

MICROSOFT TEAMS

All students are added to the class channel on MS Teams. I will use Teams for posting class handouts, study notes, assignments, supplementary reading material, and other resources. In the event that students are ill or are required to self-isolate, they will be able to access class materials and keep up with the class.
