Welcome to **Philosophy 12**! The objective of this course is to investigate, inquire, discuss, and interpret the following big ideas from the **New BC Curriculum**:

- 1. Philosophy is a discipline that examines the fundamental nature of knowledge, reality, and existence.
- 2. Philosophy provides tools for investigating meaning and fostering understanding of different ways of thinking.
- 3. Examining questions in philosophy allows people to question their assumptions and better understand their own beliefs.
- 4. While philosophical questions often examine issues with no definitive answers, logic and reasoned arguments can show which answers have more or less value.

Course Content:

Philosophy 12 at Argyle is designed to be an intellectually stimulating survey course around Philosophy, challenging students to think outside the box. As a result, students will get the opportunity to explore a broad range of questions, ranging from Epistemological questions like "Can we actually know anything" to Metaphysical questions like "do humans actually have free will?" The beauty of this course is that students get to focus much of our time discussing how the different concepts learned both affect and apply to their everyday lives. All you need to be successful in this class is an ability to think critically, communicate your ideas, and work hard!

Course Topics:

- 1. Logic and Philosophical Methods
- 2. Metaphysics:
 - a. Freewill
 - b. Personal Identity
 - c. Existentialism and Nihilism
- 3. Epistemology Descartes and Locke
- 4. Ethics
 - a. Normative ethical frameworks
 - b. Thought experiments
- 5. Social and Political Philosophy The Social Contract
- 6. Ethics Bowl Final Assignment

<u>Evaluation</u>: This course is heavily discussion based - requiring students to be comfortable regularly speaking in class, and keep up with course readings. Students are evaluated on an ongoing basis. Student's marks are based on a combination of in-class discussions, quizzes, projects, debates, ethics bowls and classroom activities. All submitted work that is graded is combined and will be counted towards final marks. Each student has the ability to be successful in this course; in most cases, success is simply a choice and involves a sincere effort. For each major assessment, rubrics will be provided to help you clearly understand how marks will be awarded. **Each assessment should be viewed as an opportunity to show me what you know**.

<u>Class Resources:</u> While most of the classroom resources will be presented in class through lectures and handouts, we will also be using The Philosophy Book and a free online digital textbook from OpenStax called Introduction to Philosophy. <u>MS Teams</u> This class will use Microsoft Teams as a digital platform for communicating key information, assignments, and resources to students. It is important that students regular check MS teams to make sure they are up to date. MS teams is used to support in-person learning, not to replace it, and attendance in class remains crucial to success.

<u>Policies and Procedures</u>: Cell phones are not allowed in class. They may only be used during in-class independent work, after asking Mr. Perrin for permission. Students are expected to behave maturely, respecting themselves, others, and the learning environment, while abiding by Argyle's Code of Conduct at all times. Please do not damage the property of others or use it without prior permission. Much of what we learn comes from our experiences in the classroom, so it is important that students attend. If a class is missed, it is up to the student to make up work and catch up with the rest of the class. Classmates should be your first point of contact for catching up, followed by me if more help is required. Attending flex is key to catching up on missed classes. The teacher's permission is needed to leave the classroom one at a time. It is important that the teacher knows exactly where everyone is in case of an emergency. Return to class promptly.
