Spanish 9 Course Outline

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Course description

In this course, our goal will be to acquire Spanish language. "Acquiring" a language is very different than "learning" a language. Acquiring is something that happens to you instead of something that you make happen. When you learned how to speak your first language, you <u>acquired</u> it naturally by listening to other people speak it around you for a long time, not by studying it. Therefore, almost all of our class time will be spent using Spanish-not using English to talk about Spanish-and the focus will be on listening and reading instead of speaking and writing. Those skills will come naturally as you take in more and more Spanish by listening and reading. In this course we do not use any textbook, we will not do any worksheets. We will acquire Spanish through storytelling, or as I like to call it, "storyasking." In other words, the storyteller (the teacher) usually doesn't know what will happen in the story, and so he/she asks the audience what they want to happen at different parts of the story. So, often the students decide what will happen in a given story.

BIG IDEAS

Listening and viewing with intent supports our acquisition and understanding of a new language.

Creative works allow us to experience culture and appreciate cultural diversity.

We can share our experiences and Perspectives through stories.

Acquiring a new language allows us to explore our identity and Culture from a new perspective.

Conversing about things we care about can motivate our learning of a new language.

Class participation

It is imperative for you to participate and engage with the class dynamic in order to achieve the understanding and use of the language.

- Regular attendance is mandatory to be successful in this course. All learning is based upon the stories that are told in class; there is no textbook for this course. Simply put, if you miss class, you will miss the stories, and it will be very difficult to catch up.
- Students must look like they are participating: you need to act engaged, contribute to stories and discussions, listen to me and your classmates, asking questions when you do not understand, taking notes when appropriate, and speaking as much Spanish as you can.

Assessment and Evaluation

Your daily homework consists of reviewing all new vocabulary and reviewing each story we cover. You will also have one digital comic strip and one dramatization per story. Students will be assessed in a variety of ways for this course. All quizzes and timed writings will be based on the stories told in class. Please note that these assessments are unannounced and that in order to be successful, you **must attend class and review regularly.** Students are encouraged to seek extra help, which is available every Day 1 at lunch in room 206.

All assessment will be based upon course curricular competencies and will be assessed using the following assessment standards:
