LAC

The Learning Assistance Center

The LAC Center is for students who have been identified as needing extra support in order to be successful in their academic classes. Students are referred to LAC by classroom teachers, School Based Resource Teachers and Counsellors.

Parents/guardians sometimes identify a need that has come up and notifies us and as a School Based Resource Team we come up with a plan of support. LAC is one of those supports.

What are the LAC tiers?

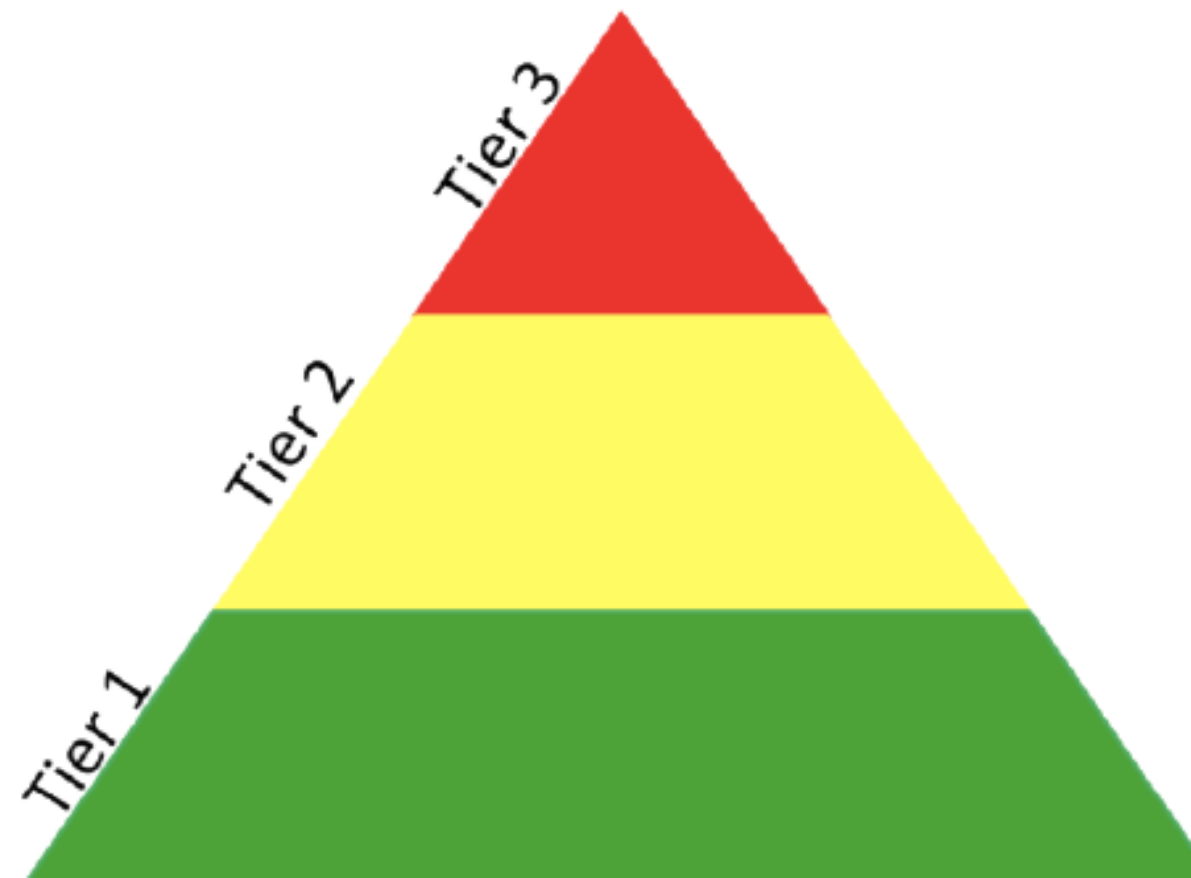
LAC has several tiers to meet the varying support needs of our students and appropriately disperse and allocate our resources. Students may move up or down in these tiers as their needs and supports change.

LAC Tier 1 – Lowest level of support: Students have access to LAC during Tutorials and class time, but there is no mandatory attendance. An LST will take case management of this student and check in with teachers for progress updates.

LAC Tier 2 – Students still retain their full schedule of registered courses. They are required to attend LAC during Tutorials weekly for closer monitoring and have access to LAC during class time during independent work time and quizzes/tests. Most students are in Tier 2 LAC.

- Grade 8 – 9 students also have several morning lessons on executive functioning skills and learning skills such as note-taking, studying and self-advocacy.
- Grade 10 – 12 students can get credit for LAC in Tier 2 upon completion of a portfolio

LAC Tier 3 – Highest level of support: Students replace one of their regular courses with a full block of LAC. Students get support with homework, as well as coaching and lessons on other skills such as organization, time management, self-advocacy, and learning habits.



Tier 1/2 Supports PLUS

Enrolling Block of LAC, focus on homework support & skill development in executive functioning/ foundational skills

Tier 1 Supports PLUS

Required LAC Tutorial attendance, focus on executive functioning skills & homework support.

Optional access to LAC during Tutorials & class time, progress monitoring by an LAC teacher.

PEAK

Peak Performance is a non-credit adjusted timetabling request option for elite-level student athletes and performers in Grade 10.

- Minimum of 15 hours per week of specific training in one discipline year-round at regional, provincial, or national level in sport or performing art.
- Recommendation of coach or person responsible for training program indicating that the applicant is training a minimum of 15 hours per week under their supervision, and proof that this training conflicts with our school schedule.
- PEAK does **NOT** exempt you from PE 10 (grad. requirement)

Submit a completed application to your counsellor by May 1st for priority placement final deadline is June 1st.

Why take a summer course?

APPLY EARLY! COURSES FILL VERY QUICKLY!

Guidelines:

1. Choose your courses for the Fall based on the assumption that you have completed summer classes successfully.
2. Be aware that there is no guarantee of a spot in a senior class if you advance through summer. You will be placed on a waitlist and seniors will have priority if there is a lack of space.
3. Have your parent/guardian email me informing me they intend to have you do an ACADEMIC summer class and indicate which course that will be.
 - a. Example: Tracy will be taking Science 10 in the summer and is choosing Physics 11 for September.

Things to Think About

Make your selection based on:

- The core required subjects you need
- What you are curious about or would like to try
- What aligns with your interests, what will help you achieve balance & a well-rounded education
- What inspires you

Don't be afraid to try new things! You might find something you are really interested in that you never thought you'd enjoy until you try it!
