Orange Shirt Day

Schools across North Vancouver will recognize Canada's history of residential schools with Orange Shirt Day on Monday, October 1st.

First Nations residential schools were established across Canada in an effort to assimilate First Nations children into European customs and lifestyles. Over 150, 000 children were taken from their homes and put into 130 residential schools across Canada. Taken from their families, these children were not allowed to speak their language, nor take part in any First Nations ceremonies, activities, or cultural events. These schools existed for over one hundred years, with the last residential school closing in 1996.

Orange Shirt Day provides us opportunity to reflect on this dark part of Canada's history, but, importantly, gives us reason to celebrate the positive direction our Canadian society is headed in as we move towards reconciliation. Students are encouraged to show their support for our First Nations people, and students in our school who are of First Nations heritage by proudly wearing an orange shirt.

The school will be holding an assembly on Monday, October 1st, and classroom activities will continue the learning around self-identity and human rights during the week.
