Happy Lunar New Year! February is already off to a great start with our learning community deepening their exploration of kindness. Many learning opportunities, including collaborative creations of Black History Month Biography Posters, opportunities to spread acts of kindness, and outdoor learning programs, are planned for this month!

As part of our school plan's goal to explore diversity in our learning community, we learn about how to create a culture of inclusion all year long. We hope to further expand on these explorations this month as we discuss kindness and open-mindedness through the opportunities provided by Black History Month, Kindness Month, and Pink Shirt Day. We continue to do this in a variety of ways, from integration of topics related to diversity in our Units of Inquiry to deepening our understanding of social-emotional learning through Second Step to stand-alone topics around Black History also being taught in classrooms. Please remember to keep your children at home when they are unwell as this helps us continue to function as a learning community in a healthy manner. Having been through this journey together in the past few years, we are so excited to be able to bring in the community again to our school as per the current Health & Safety Guidelines. Therefore, the reminder to stay home when sick also applies to all of our visitors and volunteers. We appreciate your cooperation in helping us ensure that we are able to continue to do such community events in a safe and healthy manner.

- Please **practice health awareness** by checking for symptoms of illness and staying home if sick.
- Wearing a mask or face covering is a personal choice. Let's continue to be supportive and kind.
- Practice hand hygiene often.
- · Practice respiratory etiquette.
- Avoid sharing items that come into contact with the mouth (e.g. food, drinks, utensils, etc.)
- To help us prevent crowding, we kindly request that parents and guardians are mindful of not gathering on school grounds or inside of the school during the school day.
- Also, a friendly reminder to please **supervise any children** you may be responsible for before school (during drop-off) and after school (during pick-up) while on school grounds. Dogs are not permitted on school grounds.
- If adults must enter the building, we request that you go directly to the office to sign-in.
- We will continue to have a Drop Table at the front of the office as well.
- Staff, children, or other persons in the school setting who test positive for COVID-19 should follow the guidance on the BCCDC website as to how long they should self-isolate. They can return to school when they no longer need to self-isolate, as long as symptoms have improved, and they are well enough to participate in regular activities.

Dear Capilano Elementary Parents and Guardians:

Subject: Emergency "Lockdown" Procedure and Practice Drill - February 16, 2023 at 11:45

The North Vancouver School District, in partnership with the North Vancouver R.C.M.P., has recently undertaken an annual review of our emergency lockdown procedures. Between February 5 and March 10, 2023, all schools in the NVSD will be conducting a practice lockdown drill, which will include the participation of all students and staff. At Capilano, we will be conducting our lockdown drill on February 16, 2023.

In preparing this communication, I realize that even the mention of the word "lockdown" can introduce unwelcome thoughts, and raises questions and concerns. On page 2 of this letter, please find a series of Questions & Answers to further explain what a "lockdown" means and our procedures for addressing this scenario, however unlikely, in our schools.

We realize that an actual lockdown scenario is intensely stressful for everyone involved. One of the most common reactions in parents is to be able to reach their child by cellphone. However, as is explained in the Q & A, cellphone communication can put individuals who find themselves in a lockdown situation at greater risk. For this reason, we ask all parents for their cooperation in respecting the law enforcement directive prohibiting the use of cellphones by staff and students during a lockdown.

Both the North Vancouver School District, and our school, recognize our collective responsibility for the safety of students and staff on our premises, at all times. While the likelihood of threatening behaviours/incidents in our schools is very, very low, we hope you will find this knowledge of our procedures to be reassuring. Please don't hesitate to discuss this information with myself here at the school. "Lockdown" Procedure and Practice Drills - Questions & Answers

What is a "school lockdown"?

A lockdown is an emergency procedure designed to protect occupants from an external harm, or contain the movement of occupants when a danger is present in, or around, the building. In a school lockdown, only emergency response teams from law enforcement will enter the school. A "lockdown" means that people must stay where they are and cannot leave until escorted outside by response personnel.

Are there different procedures depending upon the situation?

Yes. There are three different distinctions of "lockdown" that direct how a situation will beaddressed:

Level 1 "LOCKDOWN" – The danger is present inside the school. Level 2 "HOLD AND SECURE" – The danger is close to, but not inside the building Level 3 "SHELTER IN PLACE" – A risk is in the surrounding area.

How are school staff prepared to handle a lockdown situation?

School-based staff are trained in how to recognize and respond to all three lockdown scenarios.

Why do children have to practice a lockdown drill? Isn't that creating a stressful situation?

Particularly in emergency situations, we are all more confident, less anxious, and better able to cope whenwe know there is a plan in place. An essential part of the lockdown drill in our schools is for staff to lead conversations about the experience afterwards to reassure students and help them develop new coping and self-calming techniques for the future.

May I communicate with my child during a lockdown?

It's expected that many parents will feel an urgent need to contact their child in a lockdown situation. However, any sound from a cellphone can alert the danger/intruder to the presence of an individual or group, placing them, and everyone in their vicinity, at greater risk. For this reason, students and staff are not permitted to use cellphones during a lockdown situation.

Communications both in and out of a school under lockdown are restricted to law enforcement personneland their designates—including school principals and school district senior administrators.

During a school lockdown, where can I learn more information?

Recognizing that telephone reception could quickly become overwhelmed by a high volume of calls in a lockdown situation, the School District will update its website as information is released to us through the R.C.M.P..

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
