Approved School Calendar for 2023-2024 School Year

Updates to Communicating Student Learning (Report Cards) *Starting in 2023-2024 School Year

Communicating student learning is a vital component of the learning process and fundamental to student success. It is an ongoing process that takes place throughout the school year; involves the teacher, student and parent/guardian; and can take a variety of forms. **Beginning in the 2023-2024 school year**, as per the BC Ministry of Education and Child Care's updated mandate (<u>click here</u>), the way teachers and schools communicate student learning, and the format of traditional report cards, is shifting. There have been communications sent through the Superintendent's Office (<u>link here</u>) about how this relates to NVSD. We have also been speaking about Reporting Updates at PAC Meetings, including the one that will take place in June. At Capilano, the practices will look quite similar to the practice we have already been following as we have been involved in updated methods of reporting in our Family of Schools. There will be slight changes: including a change to our first term conferences (earlier conference dates in Term o1 that will look slightly different than Student-Family-Teacher Conferences) and first term reporting (reporting might shift back to MyEd similar to Term o2 and Term o3). More information will be shared at the start of the 2023-2024 school year.

- To help us prevent crowding, we kindly request that parents and guardians are mindful of not gathering on school grounds or inside of the school during the school day.
- Also, a friendly reminder to please **supervise any children** you may be responsible for before school (during dropoff) and after school (during pick-up) while on school grounds. Dogs are not permitted on school grounds.
- If adults must enter the building, we request that you go directly to the office to sign-in.
- We will continue to have a Drop Table at the front of the office as well.
- Staff, children, or other persons in the school setting who test positive for COVID-19 should follow the guidance on the BCCDC website as to how long they should self-isolate. They can return to school when they no longer need to self-isolate, as long as symptoms have improved, and they are well enough to participate in regular activities.

- In Grade 2, Axel shares I am safe at school when I don't jump off things that I could hurt myself on.
- In Grade 2, Sienna shares I am safe at home when my parents are cooking and I stay away from the stove.
- In Grade 2, Duncan shares I am safe at school by not pushing.
- In Grade 2, Ella shares I am safe in the community when I stay close to my mommy. I don't talk to strangers on the computer or give them my address.
- In Grade 3, Karleigh shares I am safe in the community by caring for others, keeping them safe.
- In Grade 3, Manu shares I am safe in the community by not watching videos that are not appropriate for my age.
- In Grade 4, Martha shares I am safe at home when I think I need help and I ask for it.
- In Grade 4, Henrique shares I am safe at school by following the rules.
- In Grade 6, Serena shares I am safe at school when I stay in bounds and set a good example for others when I use my words instead of my body.
