





Areas of Exploration: Lang & Lit

Readers, Writers, and Text:

The study of the non-literary texts and literary works focuses on the nature of language and communication and the nature of literature and its study. This study includes the investigation of how texts themselves operate as well as the contexts and complexities of production and reception.

Time and Space:

The focus is on the consideration of personal and cultural perspectives, the development of broader perspectives, and an awareness of the ways in which context is tied to meaning

Intertextuality:

Their study focuses on intertextual relationships with possibilities to explore various topics, thematic concerns, generic conventions, modes or literary traditions that have been introduced throughout the course. The focus is on the development of critical response grounded in an understanding of the complex relationships among texts.



DP Assessment

- ♦ Consists of
 - ♦ Internal Assessment (IA's)
 - ♦ External Assessment (Exams 70-80%)
- ♦ These two components combine to make up the final IB score.
- ♦ Students receive their final IB scores from IBO in July 2023.

Internal Assessment:

- ♦ Assessed internally by the teacher and moderated by an IB moderator
- Each course has unique IA specifications
- **♦ IA Deadlines are very important**
- ♦ DP team has a 2 year timeline to spread out the IA's for student balance
 - ♦ Year 1: CAS, EE, Geo, History, TOK
 - ♦ Year 2: Art, Lang & Lit, Language B, Math, Sciences

May 2023 IBO Updates

⋄ May 2023 Exams are continuing as scheduled with NO adaptations.

♦ IB recognizes that these students have also been affected by the disruption of the pandemic and will take this into consideration whilst setting grade boundaries.

Earning the IB Diploma

- Each of 6 courses max of 7 points
 - $6 \times 7 = 42$
- Core curriculum extra points (TOK, EE, & CAS)
 - max 3 extra points
- Total out of 45 maximum
 - 42 + 3 = 45
- Minimum score of **24 points** to earn diploma

Earning the IB Diploma – Additional Requirements

- CAS requirements must be met
- Pass Theory of Knowledge (grades A through D)
- Pass Extended Essay (grades A through D)
- Complete all Internal Assessments
- Earn a grade above 1 for all subjects/levels
- No more than 2 level 2's (HL or SL)
- No more than 3 level 3's (HL or SL)
- at least 12 points on HL subjects
- at least **9 points on SL** subjects

- ♦ An educated prediction by the teacher. The grade a student has demonstrated they are capable of achieving in the course.
- ♦ Based on assessment of the student's achievement against the course objectives.

School % Mark (as required by the Ministry of Education)

- ♦ Converted from the IB level
- ♦ Represents the student's achievement in the comparable BC course.

- ♦ There is NO flexibility on dates for these exams
- ♦ do not make plans during this time





Admission Requirements...

Check with Institution for:

- General Requirements
- ♦ Courses (grade 11 & 12)
- Second Language requirements
- Math requirements
- English Language requirements
- Faculty/Program Requirements

Each institution is unique. There are many changes this year. Be sure to double check.

Admissions averages

English Language Requirements...

- ♦ If you have had less than 4 consecutive years of school in English you should check the English Competency requirements for schools you are applying to.
- ♦ Some schools may accept a minimum grade % in English 12
- ♦ Take an English Language Proficiency test approved by the institution you are applying to. (ex. IELTS, TOEFL, CAEL, PTE)
- Check when test results are required typically prior to application evaluation



Researching University Admissions

- Must look at each website for information specific to that institution
- ♦ Be specific when searching:
- ♦ Including "IB" "undergraduate" and "admissions" will help you get to the most accurate information
- ♦ Transfer credit is different at each school
- Admissions averages/intake is different at each school
- ♦ Some use IB scores
- ♦ Others use % grades




- Applications open now
- ♦ Traditionally, students could report your grades to us between January 15 and March 31.
 - ♦ Updated Information on how to report your high school grades coming soon
- ♦ International Baccalaureate students are eligible for admission on the basis of successful completion of the IB Diploma.
- ♦ Capilano University English Language Requirements and program specific requirements must also be met.
- For those students who are completing both the IB Diploma and another high school curriculum, Capilano will use the credential which offers the applicant the best advantage.



- ♦ December 1st Application deadline for students wishing to be considered for Major Entrance Scholarships and First-Round Offers
 - ♦ NOTE: IB Students are not considered for 1st Round Offers
- ♦ January 15th General application deadline for all students
- ♦ February May
- ♦ Predicted grades generally in by February 18th for offers by mid-April
- ♦ IB Predicted grades will be forwarded by the IB Coordinator
- Skip the Academic Profile section (non IB students only)

- ♦ October 1 Application for admission for Fall term opens
- ♦ December 15th Deadline to apply for major entrance scholarships and entrance bursaries
- ♦ January 15th Deadline to submit documents for major entrance scholarships
- ♦ **January 31**st Deadline to apply for admission
- ♦ Predicted grades generally in by February 18th for admission offers by May
- Offers of admission are based on Predicted Grades.
- ♦ IB Co-ordinator will submit on students' behalf



- ♦ One full year of <u>transfer credit</u> (30 units) is granted for a completed IB Diploma. Transfer credit is awarded for all standard level and higher level subjects passed with a grade of 4 or higher.
- ♦ IB Diploma holders with total predicted IB points in the high 20s, including bonus points, will qualify for early conditional admission to most programs.




- ♦ January 31st Application deadline for all students
- ♦ Self-report your interim/final grade 11 and 12 marks or predicted IB score on your UVic application between February 15 and March 15.
- ♦ You can only self-report your grades once, and should report whichever marks you have at the time.



- ♦ At UVic, we award competitive entrance scholarships based on your IB scores in high school.
- ♦ If you're a Diploma Programme student with an IB score of 32 points or more (excluding bonus points), we guarantee you a scholarship of \$3,000.
- ♦ If you're a Canadian citizen, you may qualify for up to \$28,000 payable over four years.


How to apply for Admissions

- Apply online
- ♦ Need PEN, desired Faculty (1st, 2nd choice)
- Pay Fee (Credit card)
- ♦ Self-Reporting use Transcript Verification & update quarterly
- Check status ongoing



Alternate Pathways to a University Degree

- ♦ There are many ways to end up with a university degree other than direct entry from high school to a major university
- Many smaller college/universities have lower admissions averages, smaller class sizes, and direct transfer opportunities to university
- ♦ Some colleges and universities offer ways to upgrade and/or take pre-requisite courses






- ♦ Keep track of all applications Excel spreadsheet / in the cloud / on phone
- Will receive student # & info on how to access your student site
- ♦ Look for contact info in confirmation email/letter
- Check if additional/supplemental applications are needed
- ♦ Continue to monitor account for any additional paperwork/deadlines etc.
 - Making a master to-do list with deadlines helps!

Accepting an Offer

- Many schools extend offers throughout the Spring in multiple rounds and well into the summer
- ♦ Different programs offer at different times, so don't worry if you friends have heard and you haven't
- ♦ Each offer will come with an acceptance deadline you need to officially accept the offer before this date
- ♦ You will likely need to pay a deposit when you accept the offer – you can accept offers at more than one institution (except in Ontario) but it will cost you
- ♦ All offers are conditional read conditions of each offer carefully
- ♦ All offers are confirmed in July once final grades have been released by Ministry to institutions

Reference Letters

- ♦ Students should ask teachers <u>well in advance</u> to give them time to write a thoughtful letter.
- ♦ Students should be prepared to provide a resume or other information to support the letter.
