#### **NEWS FROM THE CITY OF NORTH VANCOUVER**

#### **CHANGES TO REPORTING STUDENT LEARNING NEXT YEAR**

Communicating student learning is a vital component of the learning process and fundamental to student success. It is an ongoing process that takes place throughout the school year; involves the teacher, student, and parent/guardian; and can take a variety of forms.

Implemented in the 2023-2024 school year, there will be some shift in the traditional format and with the way teachers and schools communicate student learning.

#### What is changing?

The <u>K-12 Reporting Policy</u> prepared by the Ministry of Education and Child Care, provides helpful information on what is changing, what will remain the same, and the benefits to these changes.

#### What is new?

- Student reporting practices that align with B.C.'s curriculum and provincial assessment system.
- Provincial Proficiency Scale (vs. grades or percentages) for students in Grades K to 9.
- Changing the "I" reporting symbol to "IE" to indicate "insufficient evidence" of learning instead of "incomplete" learning.
- Student self-assessment of Core Competencies and goal setting, in all grades in the three written reports.
- All learners, including students with a disability or diverse ability, will receive regular communications of student learning in the same way as their peers in any other program.

#### Why is this important?

Changes to student reporting are the result of many years of engagement and consultation by the Ministry of Education and Child Care with rights holders, education partners, teachers, families, students, and members of the public. The changes will provide key benefits, including:

- Information to students and families on where the student is and how to help them move forward in their learning
- A view of learning as ongoing, and a lifelong process of competency development.

# 2023-2024 BELL SCHEDULE / CALENDAR / SCHOOL FEES BELL SCHEDULE 2023-2024 and Calendar

There will be a slight change to our bell schedule for the 2023-2024 school year. As per Ministry requirements, our day will now reflect 294 minutes versus 297 from this year. A copy of the new bell schedule and approved calendar with District / School based Pro-Days and early dismissal days will be sent home to families at the end of May.

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#### **APPROVED CALENDAR 2023-2024**

The calendar for next year is available through the following link: <u>District Calendar 2023-2024</u> There will be 4 Collaboration days (2PM dismissal) and 6 early dismissals (2PM) assigned to accommodate parent/teacher/student conferences. Additionally, our school based professional days (school not in session) have been established as Wednesday, November 1, 2023, and Thursday, June 27, 2024. A table calendar will be posted to our website and emailed home at the end of May.

## **SCHOOL FEES 2023-2024**

There are no increases to fees for the 2023-2024 school year.

In accordance with the School Act and with School Board Fees Ministerial Order, we would like to advise all Queensbury families of the school fees that will be charged for the 2023–2024 school year. A fee may be charged to recover some, or all of the costs related to enriched or additional learning opportunities. In all cases, fees are kept to a minimum. The Board may charge a fee at cost for: transportation, entrance fees and equipment rental associated with field trips or special events. Last year an "administration fee" for cash on-line and the use of credit cards was implemented. This fee has been included in the costs below.

School Supplies – we do the shopping for you!! By buying in bulk, we are able to trim costs, get exactly what each teacher needs, and reduce waste. We can provide an individual supply list for you if you'd prefer to shop on your own. Please let us know by June 1, 2023 if you would like your own list.
