

### Action taken - 2018

#### IN THE AGENDA BOOK - DRUGS, ALCOHOL, SMOKING AND E-CIGARETTES

Students found using, possessing, or being with others involved with drugs (including marijuana or marijuana products) or alcohol at school or at school-sponsored events will be suspended. Such actions may include police involvement. Subsequent involvement in drugs or alcohol will require a re-entry plan to return to school. Any student found supplying drugs or alcohol to others will be suspended, and referred to an outside agency and/or the police.

In accordance with Section 2.2 of the Tobacco and Vapour Products Control Act, effective

September 1, 2016, the use of tobacco and vapour products is banned on all public and private K-12 schools in British Columbia. A person must not smoke, nor be with others involved in smoking or using tobacco products or e-cigarettes, nor hold lighted tobacco or activated e-cigarettes, in or on school property.

This ban extends to all school property 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, regardless of whether or not school is in session. The ban also includes vehicles, parking lots, sports fields, driveways, courtvards, and private vehicles parked on school property.
