Course Description:

This course will include an exploration of personal and cultural identities, memories, and stories in a range of genres. Students will develop their skills in language arts through a focused study of many forms of text and will have opportunities to develop their inferential and critical thinking skills through reading, listening, watching, speaking, and design processes.

Within a supportive community, students will collaborate on designing, writing, producing and performing texts.

Inquiry Questions:

- How do energy transformations affect the environment?
- How are the changes in pH chemistry due to human activity affecting the environment?
- Who should have the knowledge, control, or ownership of an organism's genetic makeup? Should we be able to use genetic engineering to modify organisms?
- How has the structure of the Universe changed since the Big Bang?
