SCHOOL FEES

Note that students with outstanding athletic and school fees will not be able to pick up their Yearbooks or Grad Gowns in June until their accounts are up to date.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Windsor would like to raise the awareness of families around the importance of attendance and its relation to student outcomes. Attendance matters; research has shown that students who attend less than 90% of the time (this is the equivalent to ½ day per week; students who miss several consecutive days are even more at risk) have greater academic struggles, disengage from school, and are at risk for not graduating. It also removes them from social circles and can make it challenging for them to reintegrate back with friends, particularly if they have missed important social bonding situations. WHEN REPORTING ABSENCES

-You may report an absence on same the day until 3:00 p.m., in advance for a future date if you know ahead of time, or for previous dates that were missed.

Please indicate:

- Student First Name
- Student Last Name (if leaving a voice message please spell the last name)
- Grade
- Date of absence (whole day/portion of the day)
- Explanation for absence ("excused", "ill", "appointment", "vacation").

It is critical that student absence explanations are specific to ensure accurate reporting to the School District and Public Health Unit, when necessary.

- Your name & relationship with the student. (Only messages from parents and legal guardians are accepted)

CAREER COURSES/PROGRAMS

Curious about careers, hands-on learning, or skilled trades? Check out these courses/programs:

Work Experience 12A/B (WEX 12A/B)

Explore careers, build skills, and earn credits while learning in the real world! WEX places students in volunteer work placements that match their interests and future goals. Students may also use their own paid job if it aligns with their area of interest.

Gain 90 hours of hands-on work experience while discovering your potential!

Youth Work in Trades (YWIT)

Are you 15+ and already working in a trade or connected to a certified tradesperson? Start your apprenticeship now and earn up to 16 school credits (4 credits per 120 hours worked), while counting hours toward apprenticeship requirements with SkilledTradesBC.

Students follow a Day 1/Day 2 rotation: one day at school, the other at their workplace.

Applications are due by the end of February.

Youth Train in Trades (YTIT)

In partnership with SkilledTradesBC, students receive hands on trades training at a local secondary school, post-secondary partner, or a SkilledTradesBC facility. Students will learn directly from skilled instructors through practical workshops and theory.

- ✓ Spaces are limited (applications due by the end of February)
- ✓ Primarily for Grade 12 students, however Grade 11s may be considered

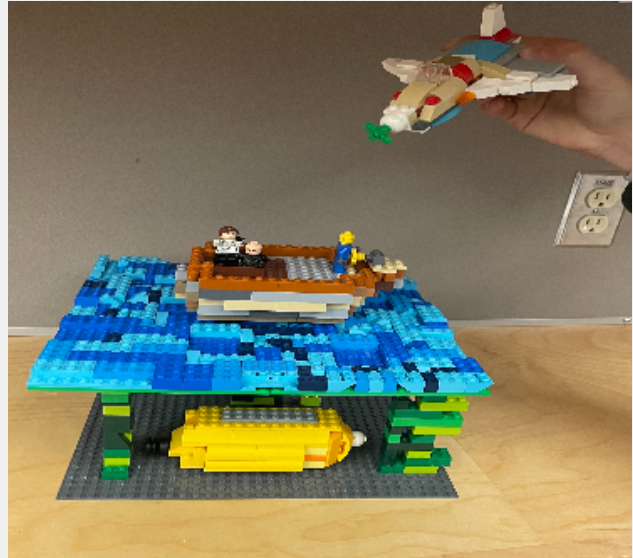

TRADITIONAL INDIGENOUS CANOE-BUILDING

Our English class recently had the unique opportunity to learn about the traditional Indigenous canoe-building process from one of our fellow students, Wesley Billy-Baker. Wesley shared the cultural significance of canoe-making, explaining how it's not just a craft, but a way to reflect deep connections to the land, water, and community. Through his demonstration and stories, we gained a deeper appreciation and understanding for the skill, patience, and knowledge passed down through generations. During his presentation, we had the opportunity to ask him questions about the process of making canoes, which made our learning experience richer and further deepened our understanding of the art. Wesley answered thoughtfully, explaining the traditional process of making canoes, the tools involved, and the care required to shape each part of the canoe with intention. Hearing all of this from a student in our school made the presentation especially meaningful. This experience grew our understandings of Indigenous traditions and the importance of learning directly from Indigenous voices from within our community.



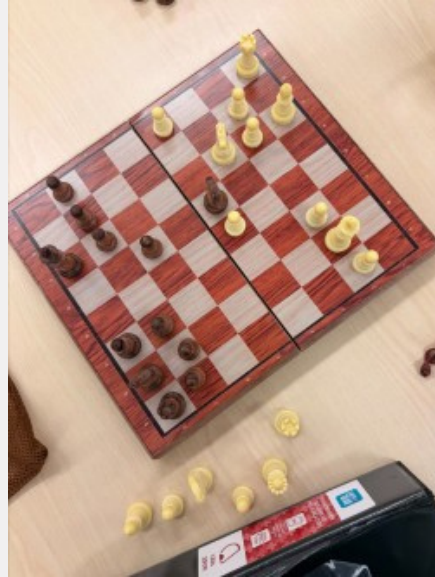
WINDSOR PHE DANCE PROJECT

PARKING AT WINDSOR

Parking is limited during the school day. With the need to provide adequate parking for school and district staff, guests, community, and students, we request that everyone adheres to the parking guidelines we have in place.

To park at Windsor students and staff must:

- register their vehicles in the office
- display decal on their windshield
- park in the correct lot
- adhere to the parking regulations

1. Broadview Lot: Parking in the front lot is for school & district staff and visitors only. **Students may not park in this lot.** Parents, please park in the available visitor spots. Please do not drop off students in the Broadview parking lot as this is a student safety issue

2. Lytton Lot: Parking is for staff and students. Unfortunately, if this lot is full, students will need to park off school site.

We have noted an increase in the number of vehicles parked illegally including in areas clearly marked as no parking. For example, vehicles parked in yellow zones, areas marked for emergency vehicles, and in front of waste disposal bins.

Students who park illegally will have their parking privileges revoked. Additionally, illegally parked vehicles may be towed without warning. While we are reluctant to resort to this, repeated warnings have not been followed. If your vehicle is towed, please contact Payless Auto Towing.

We continue to encourage students to walk or take transit to school.
