STUDENT LEARNING SURVEY

GRADE 10 LITERACY ASSESSMENT

The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment is a provincial assessment that assesses student proficiency in literacy. <u>It is a graduation requirement</u> and students will be taking the assessment on April 25th and April 27th for students needing accommodations. **All grade 10 classes are cancelled on the 25th.**

The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment assesses student ability to use critical thinking and analysis to make meaning from a diverse array of texts. It also assesses the ability of students to communicate their ideas. The Grade 10 Literacy Assessment is not based on a particular course, but on learning across multiple subjects, from kindergarten to Grade 10.

Over spring break, Windsor's library became home to some new tenants – a hive of honeybees! Windsor now joins Argyle as the two NVSD schools participating in this education and research initiative. An organization called Beewatch (www.beewatch.ca) supplied and installed the hive itself. Two other outside groups provided funding for the project. Windsor and the school district would like to recognize and thank them for their support.

Coast Salish Gardens Program: Supporting schools to integrate Indigenous plant knowledge

The Coast Salish Gardens Program seeks to bring native plant and traditional food knowledge into the minds, hearts, and bellies of children and youth by developing native plant gardens and outdoor spaces on school grounds.

In early 2022, Farm to School BC and the Coast Salish Native Plant Nursery at Maplewood Flats collaborated to both support six North Vancouver schools develop garden spaces and develop curriculum material to encourage their use as teaching tools.



Participating schools included Norgate Xwemélch'stn Community Elementary, Sherwood Park Elementary, Carson Graham Secondary and **Windsor Secondary**, as well as Tsleil-Waututh Nation si?ám θ 9t School and Capilano Littlest Ones School - Xwemélch'stn Etsimxwawtxw.

Each school developed their own unique approach, with many creating or adding to native plant gardens, growing foods to gift to community members, learning more about traditional and contemporary uses of native plants, and connecting more to the land around their school.

WINDSOR AND THE COAST SALISH GARDENS PROGRAM



Windsor Secondary students make 'seed nuggets' using a wildflower blend that features all native plants from Maplewood Flats Coast Salish Nursery.

The program aims to go beyond simply building gardens, by providing professional development opportunities for staff and building connections between educators and community partners.

As the program continues into 2023, participants will work towards developing native plant profiles and signage featuring Skwxwú7mesh sníchim and həńqəmińəm, as well as an online ethnobotany resource hub for schools to access.

The Coast Salish Gardens Program is a partnership between Farm to School BC (administered by Public Health Association of BC) and Maplewood Flats (an initiative of the Wild Bird Trust of BC). This project is supported by the BC Ministry of Health and BC Ministry of Public Safety and Solicitor General, Vancity, and the TD Friends of the Environment Fund.

Please remember to update your contact information with the school when changes occur.


When changing your mailing address, please attach a copy of proof of address. An example would be a utility bill, BCID, Drivers Licence, credit card invoice etc.
