A Guide for Teachers & Staff How to Respond to Racism in your Classroom



Be Aware

- Listen carefully for any racist language, jokes, or behaviors, whether explicit or subtle.
- Act quickly when you witness or hear incidents of racism. Ignoring these behaviors can imply acceptance and foster a harmful environment.

Respond Calmly and Firmly

Name the behavior without labeling the student, e.g., "that comment is not respectful and goes against our values of respect for everyone."

Create a Safe Environment

- Set Ground Rules: begin by establishing clear, respectful communication standards in the classroom.
- Promote conversations around diversity, respect, and inclusivity. Teach students how to have respectful conversations about difficult topics.

"In our classroom, everyone is important, and we make sure everyone feels safe and respected. We don't allow unkind words or actions toward others."

Educate and Empower

- Focus on teachable moments: without singling out any student, address why the words/behavior could be harmful and discuss the potential impact on individuals and communities.
- Incorporate Anti-Racism Education: regularly integrate lessons about diversity, equity, and inclusion into your curriculum.

"We learn about racism so we can understand each other better, treat everyone fairly, and help make our world kinder and safer for everyone."



Remember: Your consistent response to racist comments and actions sets the standard for what is acceptable and reinforces a respectful, inclusive environment for all.
