Limit screen time.

Don't overschedule your child.

Give your child age appropriate chores to do.

Teach your child how to open their lunch box and containers independently.

Practice basic math skills at home.

Follow age guidelines on social media apps.

Ensure your child gets enough sleep for their age and/or developmental age.

Teach your child how compromise works and how to have flexible thinking.

Eat meals together as a family and talk.

Play lots of games with your kids and make sure they don't always win.

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Are you a snowplow parent?

Allow your child to fail and struggle - this is how they develop resilience and self-confidence. Be there to support and love them, but allow them to do the work.
