The 94 Calls to Action

Do you know the **94 Calls to Action**?

Here is Action 10 as it relates to education:



We call upon the federal government to draft new Aboriginal education legislation with the full participation and informed consent of Aboriginal peoples. The new legislation would include a commitment to sufficient funding and would incorporate the following principles:

- i. Providing sufficient funding to close identified educational achievement gaps within one generation.
- ii. Improving education attainment levels and success rates.
- iii. Developing culturally appropriate curricula.
- iv. Protecting the rights to Aboriginal languages including the teaching of Aboriginal languages as credit courses.
- v. Enabling parental and community responsibility, control, and accountability, similar to what parents enjoy in public school systems.
- vi. Enabling parents to fully participate in the education of their children.
- vii. Respecting and honouring Treaty relationships.

Métis Paddle Making at Carson Graham




During the month of November, all grade 8 students participated in an interdisciplinary unit (Math and English) to explore the Statement of Inquiry, that *Relationships show up in many different places and we communicate in different ways.* The focus of this interdisciplinary unit was the opportunity to learn about Indigenous worldview and culture, by working with Métis artisan, Pat Calihou, to learn how to carve a Métis paddle (math classes) and by experiencing traditional oral stories and jigging in English classes. Students learned about Métis protocol and culture through the teachings, oral stories and by learning the Red River Jig! In addition to Pat Calihou, Heather Myhre NVSD Indigenous Success Teacher and Stephanie Maki, Indigenous Support Teacher shared Métis Traditional stories and were joined by the Norgate Jigglets to share Métis dance with all the grade




8's. Carson also welcomed several guests to participate and learn with the students. Guests included, Brad Baker, District Principal of Indigenous Education, Chris Atchinson, Assistant Superintendent and several guests from different school districts. From their experiences, students were asked to reflect on the three MYP (Middle Years Program) Unit Questions as part of the formative and summative assessments. Furthermore students were asked to reflect and demonstrate their understanding that experiences connect to place, story, cultural practices and perspectives relevant to First Peoples, specifically Métis for this unit.







