Did you know that the area referred to as Horseshoe Bay is a herring harvesting location and is known as Ch'axa'y "Sizzling waters?"



Did you know that Inuktitut is one dialect of Inuit languages? Inuktitut is also the term used collectively for Inuit languages. There are at least 9 dialects that differ across a vast region that encompasses territory from Alaska to Greenland.


"The Government of Nunavut selected the term Inuktut to represent all of the Inuit dialects spoken in Nunavut, including Inuktitut and Inuinnaqtun. In this way Inuktut is recognized as a single language." <u>tusaalanga</u>.




Takannaaaluk is a bilingual book that was released in November 2018 written by Herve Paniaq, an elder from Nunavut.
