Suggested Areas of Focus are the First Peoples Principles of Learning

Additional suggested topics for 90 minute sessions, may include but not be limited to:

- * Indigenous Education Where are we as a school? Examine the First People Principles of *Learning and how are we embedding them into our school culture.
- * Curriculum Development Sharing of resources, lesson plans and unit plans what works in my classroom.
- *Sharing of Story arrange for a speaker/knowledge keeper to attend your session to provide local insight.
- *Learning from the Land take a walking a field trip of the ancestral lands of the Squamish and/or Tsleil Waututh with a local knowledge keeper.
- *Film Screening Colonization Road, Indian Horse, We Were Children, plus many more options.

Land Acknowledgement in NVSD

Acknowledgement of First Nations Territory in the North Vancouver School District

As we are continuing to move forward towards reconciliation and acknowledging the First Nations land that we work on at school events and community events, we should be reminded that this is also teachable moment. Along with the acknowledgement being stated, it also the time that an individual that is making the acknowledgement can connect to their own learning.

Did you know.....

A *land acknowledgement* is made when the person/group hosting is recognizing the Indigenous community in which their organization/building is located.

Welcoming people to the land is shared by a staff or community member who is traditionally from that territory, nation or community. The majority of school district personnel would Acknowledge Territory. An Acknowledging is usually the first item on the agenda. (Staff meetings, SBRT meetings, ...)

This is the basic acknowledgement that we use in the North Vancouver School District:

I would like to thank the Coast Salish people, specifically the Skwxwú7mesh Nation and Tsleil-Waututh Nation, whose unceded traditional territory the North Vancouver School District resides on. I value the opportunity to learn, share and grow on this traditional territory


