Dear Boundary Families

We hope this finds you all enjoying another weekend of mild, warm weather with family and friends. Many of us are feeling grateful and cautiously worried at the same time. This unexpected warmth midway through October is causing local droughts and unusual growing patterns for our food crops and local wildlife. This we know is likely the result of years of consumer behaviour, waste, and overindulgence.

On the eve of this Thanksgiving weekend, Boundary students were gifted a powerful Coast Salish story presented by Swalklanexw (rhymes with Capilano) Dallas Guss. Please share this again with your children:

A long time ago, even before the time of the great flood, the Cheakamus River provided food for the Squamish people. Each year, at the end of summer, when the salmon came home to spawn, the people would cast their cedar root nets into the water and get enough fish for the winter to come.

One day, a man came to fish for food for his family for the winter. He looked into the river and found that many fish were coming home this year. He said thanks to the spirit of the fish, for giving themselves as food for his family, and cast his net into the river and waited. In time, he drew his nets in, and they were full of fish, enough for his family for the whole year. He packed these away into cedar bark baskets, and prepared to go home.

But he looked into the river, and saw all those fish, and decided to cast his net again. He did so, and it again filled with fish, which he threw onto the shore. A third time, he cast his net into the water and waited.

This time, when he pulled his net in, it was torn beyond repair by sticks, stumps, rocks and branches which filled the net. To his dismay, the fish on the shore and the fish in the cedar bark baskets were also sticks, rocks, and branches. He had no fish and his nets were ruined.

It was then he looked up at the mountain, and saw Wountie, the spirit protecting the Cheakamus, who told him that he had broken the faith with the river and with nature, by taking more than he needed for himself and his family. This was the consequence.

To this day, high on the mountain overlooking the Cheakamus and Paradise Valley, is the image of Wountie, protecting the Cheakamus. The fisherman? Well, his family went hungry and starved, a lesson for all the people in his family.

This story is also shared with all students who have spent or will be spending time either at the Cheakamus Center Outdoor School or at the Coast Salish Long House just steps away. Take only what you need and leave the rest for others.

Traffic Safety

As the seasons change and bring unpredictable weather and visibility on our roads, please be aware of the safety of yourself and others while driving and walking to school. Driving through a school zone is more than simply slowing down to 30 km/hr. Drivers are expected to be extra attentive and patient as they navigate the busy areas around the school zone.

A child can be injured just as severely by a car driving at 30 km/h as one moving at 50 km/h, however the reduced speed gives the driver much more control of the vehicle and the ability to pay more attention to the surroundings. Keep in mind the attention of a child can be very narrow. While they understand safety rules and procedures, such as looking both ways before crossing a street, they may not be able to see a potential problem as far ahead as an adult. Therefore, it is up to the driver to take up the responsibility and make sure they are ready for anything that can happen in a school zone. In addition, it may be a good time to review road safety with your child(ren).

Slow down, pay attention, and make safety the right choice. Please help keep our students and families safe while driving in our neighbourhood. Please only park in designated areas, do not do U-turns on or near crosswalks/intersections, and please reduce your speed.

Wheels on the School Grounds

We encourage all students and parents to walk, wheel or roll to school, but we please ask that when you reach the school grounds, you walk your transportation to your destination. Wheeling around the school grounds puts students at risk as they may not be expecting a bike crossing the middle of the soccer field or a scooter sneaking up on them in the undercover area. These expectations are from 8:00am to 3:30pm. Please remind your child that they should be wearing a helmet when rolling to school. Thank you.


