

Hashi Puzzle

Hashiwokakero is a Japanese phrase that translates directly as '**build bridges'**. Each puzzle is based on a rectangular arrangement of islands where the number in each island tells how many bridges are connected to it. The object is to connect all islands according to the number of bridges so:

- There are no more than two bridges in the same direction
- Bridges can only be vertical or horizontal and are not allowed to cross islands or other bridges.
- When completed, all bridges are interconnected enabling passage from any island to another
