




National Indigenous History Month

National Indigenous History Month




June is National Indigenous History Month in Canada, a time to recognize the rich history, heritage, resilience and diversity of First Nations, Inuit and Métis.

Celebrating Learning

Social Justice 12—Dominican Republic



Fifteen students from Social Justice 12 went to the Dominican Republic April 27 -May 8, 2023 to build a home for a family in need in the community of L'Union Batay. This community is one of the most impoverished in the country being situated right next to a garbage dump. Many of the community members worked at the dump earning just \$3-\$5 per day in income. They shared their experiences with the students of eating one meal a day and having to ration everything. Many homes in this community do not have running water or even toilets in their homes. The conditions are dire. Students worked in 35+ degrees weather to build a home for "Nana". Nana shared her experiences with traumas, grief, poverty, homelessness and discrimination and was moved to tears on the day she received the keys to her new home. Students reported having a new outlook on their own lives after going through this life changing trip experience. Well done Social Justice 12.

PLP 11 / 12 - Stories of Hope Field Study

Recently, the PLP 11 and 12 learners had the opportunity to visit historic locations that reveal how people have persevered in times of struggle. By turning an unflinching eye to acts of terrorism and personal tragedy, learners saw how stories of hope, meaning, and purpose have emerged across history.

As we travelled, learners wrote, filmed, and edited documentary videos, answering the driving question: What lessons and inspiration can we draw from the stories of individuals and communities that have faced tragedy and overcome adversity?

After travelling through Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and Missouri, in over 15 hours in our mini vans, some highlights included the LBJ Presidential Library in Austin, the Sixth Floor Museum at Dealey Plaza, the Oklahoma City National Memorial and Museum, a tour of Black Wall Street in Tulsa, the Wonders of Wildlife National Museum & Aquarium, and so much more!! Being in the footsteps of history and engaging with those who experienced these events first hand was not just educational, but inspiring to us all.

BC First People's 12 Field Study

The B.C. First Peoples 12 cohort, along with Ms. Maxwell and Mr. Hughes, had the opportunity to travel up to Whistler with the driving question in mind: How might being on the land and listening to Indigenous peoples tell their own stories, be a part of Reconciliation?

Learners had a guided tour of the Squamish Lil'Wat Cultural Centre, learning about the traditional and current life ways and culture of both nations. After exploring the centre on their own as well, we were able to see the distinct similarities and differences between these two nations and their shared territory of Whistler.

After a relaxing lunch break in the village, learners had a second guided tour at the Audain Art Museum, exploring this collection of both Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists. We were most impressed with James Hart's dance screen: *The Scream too*, along with the private collection of Emily Carr's beautiful representations of Indigenous cultures in the 1900's.
