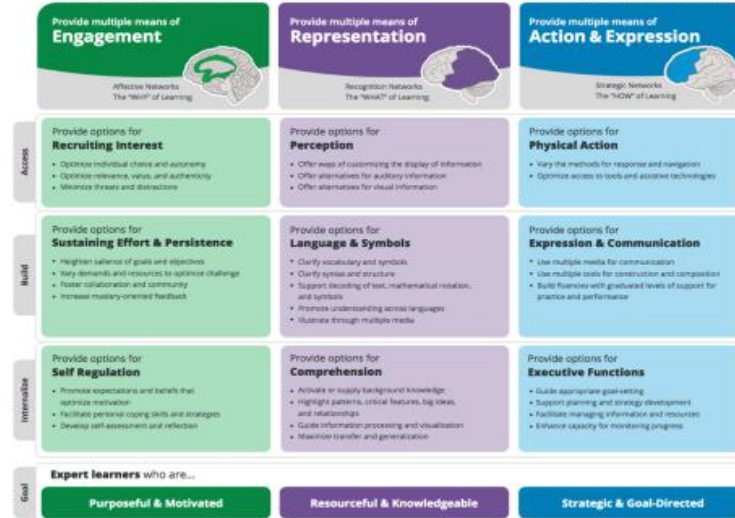

Have homework written down in the same spot every day 

Explicitly teach executive functioning & study skills 

Give an extra 3-5 minutes to organize before transitions 

Schedule a weekly organization time 

Create routines and practice them often 

Incorporate movement during instruction 

Create an end-of-the-day checklist to remember materials 

Provide brain breaks during and after instruction 

Clearly explain academic & social expectations 

Keep an extra set of books at home and in the classroom 

Use countdowns & time checks during work periods 

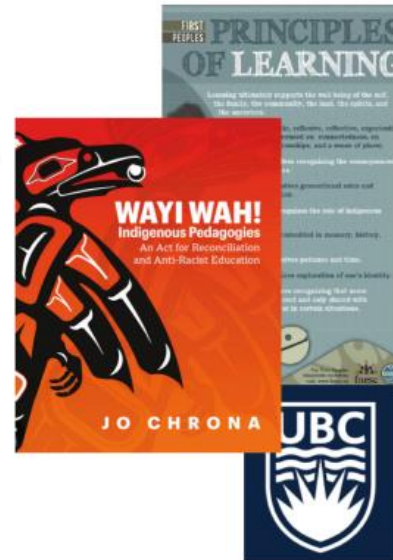

I am currently in the Social Justice 12 class where pairs of students were tasked with coming up with a social justice movement idea. My classmate, Laura Volkamer and I came up with how 'Menstrual Hygiene is a Human Right'. Our class voted on our project to be selected to move forward with as a class. With your support, by sharing our project with friends or family and donating, hopefully we can reach enough people and raise enough money to be able to meet our goal. Our goal is to make 100 or more care packages filled with pads, tampons, underwear, feminine wipes, and a chocolate bar. We will then go to the downtown Eastside of Vancouver, where the less fortunate live, and donate our care packages to the Downtown Eastside Women's Centre. With the homeless population continuously growing in Vancouver, we want to be able to help as many women as we can. We don't have a precise number of the exact population of women downtown that are homeless, but we do know that they don't have access to clean, sanitary items each month, and we want to be able to change that. We are hopeful that you will be able to help our class by donating to our GoFundMe link so we can ensure these women have the sanitary products they require and one less thing to worry about while living on the streets or in shelters.
