Indigenous Storytelling Workshops



In the News:

On January 8, 2020, Justice Douglas Thompson dismissed a case a case in the Supreme Court of BC. The complaint argued that smudging infringed on religious freedom and rights. Justice Thompson's ruling states "Being taught about beliefs is not an infringement of religious freedom – even when taught by an elder at close range and in a manner that engages the student's sense of smell as well as her sense of sight and sound and even if this teaching results in some cognitive dissonance," reference. "Smudging does not fit into the categorization of a religious practice, nor should it be made to. To attempt to do so, is to attempt to force ancestral practices into square boxes which the courts have said cannot happen," Judith Sayers, Nuu-chah-nulth Tribal Council president reference
